### Cognition data for all 51,000 participants now available

Cognition data for more than 51,000 CLSA participants are now available for access by researchers. To learn more about the CLSA research platform and accessing the data, click <a href="here">here</a>.

An assessment of 20,000 participants in the Canadian Longitudinal Study on Aging (CLSA) has shown the performance of CLSA participants is similar to what has been observed in previous studies of cognition conducted in both French and English, lending support to the use of the CLSA cognitive measures in large, epidemiological studies of aging. The research, published in *The Clinical Neuropsychologist*, was led by Dr. Holly Tuokko, a professor of psychology at the University of Victoria. ## **2017 Data Access Application Deadlines**

The 2017 deadlines for submitting applications are:

- March 13, 2017
- June 12, 2017
- October 16, 2017

Approved applicants are required to sign a CLSA Access Agreement that outlines the specific uses of data and the CLSA expectations with respect to privacy and confidentiality. Ethics approval from the applicant's institution is also required prior to data release. When planning for your project, please include in your timeframe at least five months from the application submission deadline to the time you receive your dataset. ### Research projects using CLSA data

To date, more than 64 projects using the CLSA research platform have been approved. Several approved users have presented results based on the 20,000 CLSA participants who take part in telephone interviews. These presentations have been featured as part of <u>CLSA Webinar Series</u>:

- In December 2016, Ann Toohey, a PhD candidate at the University of Calgary, presented <a href="Aging-in-place with pets: Is pet-ownership relevant to social participation and life satisfaction for older adults in Canada?">Canada?</a> The webinar focused on her thesis research, which includes an analysis of CLSA data as part of a case study exploring the role of community services in enhancing benefits and addressing challenges of pet ownership for seniors.
- In November 2016, Dr. Verena Menec, a professor in the Department of Community Health Sciences at the University of Manitoba, and Dr. Nancy Newall, an assistant professor of psychology at the Brandon University, presented a <u>Definitions of Social Isolation</u>: A pilot study using CLSA Data.
- In September 2016, David Kanters, a M.Sc. candidate at McMaster University, presented his thesis project which developed a new <u>frailty</u> <u>measurement tool</u> that was created and used to evaluate the frailty of participants in the CLSA.

# CLSA participates in Alzheimer's Association International Conference

In July 2016, the CLSA celebrated Canadian scientists working in the field of aging and international partners at a reception held during the Alzheimer's Association International Conference in Toronto.
