

Post-Doctoral Research Fellowship, Gerontology Research Centre

Simon Fraser University seeks a recent doctoral degree graduate with strong research skills and interest in analyses of large data sets in the area of health and aging. Duties will work include:

- Develop and carry out a program of research in health and aging
- Support team building across the university and nationally in the area of population health research in aging, including organization of teleconferences, workshops and/or conferences
- Assist in write new grant proposals seeking funding for this research program.

Applications are welcome from gerontology, health sciences, public health, community epidemiology, psychology, and other social sciences. The successful candidate will have publications and research interests/experience in the area health and aging, in particular, analyses of complex large data sets. The successful candidate will be involved in various projects, including analyses of CLSA data on the CIHR grant entitled, "A Multi-level Analysis of Functional, Social and Psychological Resilience and Aging."

This is a one-year position with the possibility of renewal at the renowned Gerontology Research Centre (GRC). Salary is between \$40,000 and \$55,000 (depending on experience) per annum plus a professional development allowance and standard benefits. Based at the Harbour Centre campus in downtown Vancouver, the Centre's mandate is to conduct and foster research on individual and population aging. Applicants should include a covering letter that outlines their proposed program of research to be conducted while in residence at the GRC, curriculum vitae, evidence of the qualifications being sought, two samples of their publications, and the names of three references.
