






Functional Trajectories




What Could I Look at Now?

- What factors are associated with having specific health conditions or functional capacity?
- How is health and function associated with social participation and life satisfaction?
 - Across age groups, chronic conditions, sociodemographic factors
 - For certain sub-populations (e.g., 1.9% of sample self-identify as LGB(T); 12.8% of sample was born outside of Canada)

What Could I Look at Now?

- What factors moderate the relationship between chronic diseases and function?
 - E.g., income, social support network, ethnic background, co-morbidity?
- How is multi-morbidity related to function?
 How is it related to health care use?

Functional Trajectories



What Could I Look at in the Future?

- What factors are related to the incidence of chronic conditions?
- What factors predict functional decline?
 - E.g., social environment, physical environment, socio-demographic factors, lifestyle

What Could I Look at in the Future?

- Trajectories and transitions
 - How do major life events (e.g., onset of disease, changing social network) impact health and functional trajectories?
 - What factors (e.g., medical, social) protect against functional decline or onset of specific chronic conditions?
 - How do trajectories play themselves out within and across subpopulations (e.g., age groups, ethnic groups)
